Course Description:

In the dynamic world of pediatric occupational therapy, intensity matters. This innovative and collaborative course explores the multifaceted concept of intensity—from its definition to its neurological underpinnings to specific applications in pediatric occupational therapy practice. A group of expert occupational therapists will share their insights and wisdom on the topic of intensity, equipping participants with evidence-informed strategies to deliver effective interventions and models of care that promote safety, engagement, adaptive responses, and functional growth in their clients.

Course Objectives:

By the end of the course, participants will be able to:

1. Examine various perspectives on and therapeutic components of intensity in pediatric occupational therapy.
2. Apply the concept of sensory intensity as a therapeutic variable—adjusting input within and across sensory systems to match or expand an individual's regulatory capacity—in order to foster safety, engagement, and adaptive responses through relationship-based and play-centered interventions.
3. Apply clinical reasoning in the use of sound and rhythm for therapeutic outcomes through the range of options: voice, drum, commercial music, and specialized music protocols.
4. Clinically reason the use of sensation with power and precision to support clinical outcomes across contexts.

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Speaker Biographies:

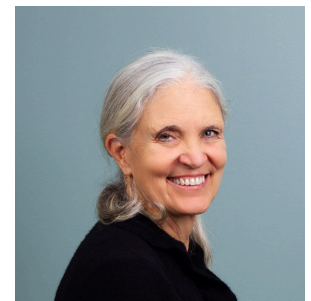
Julia Wilbarger, PhD, OTR/L, received a BS in Physiological Psychology from UC Berkeley, a MS in OT from Boston University, and a PhD in Developmental Cognitive Neuroscience from the University of Denver, Colorado. She has practiced as an OT in early intervention with high risk and developmentally delayed infants and toddlers, in the public schools and in private practice. At The Children's Hospital, Denver, she served as a clinical specialist in sensory integration. She joined the faculty at Dominican University of California in the Occupational Therapy Department as an Associate Professor in 2012. Dr. Wilbarger has done extensive research, published and presented on issues of sensory processing, sensory modulation disorders, and sensory integration in children. Her research is focused on the study of affective and sensory processing and intervention in a range of clinical populations.



Tracy Stackhouse, MA, OTR is an occupational therapist recognized internationally for her expertise in Fragile X syndrome, neurodevelopment, sensory integration, polyvagal theory, and relationship-based practices. She is the co-founder and Director of Innovation at Developmental FX, a nonprofit clinic and training organization dedicated to supporting children and families through relationship-based, neuroscience-informed care. With over four decades of experience, Tracy has worked alongside families, educators, researchers, and therapists to translate complex science into practical strategies that foster growth, resilience, and engaged belonging. She is a frequent presenter at national and international conferences, a co-author of key clinical resources, and a trusted mentor to professionals worldwide.



Nancy Lawton-Shirley, OTR/L, is an occupational therapist who has integrated many techniques into her rehabilitation and wellness clinical practice. She has been in private practice serving children and adults for over 35 years in Hudson Wisconsin. Her passion is the integration of more traditional and less traditional, cutting edge techniques and programs. She has had advanced training in a wide variety of energy techniques including: CranioSacral Therapy/Myofascial Release, Pranic Healing, AcuEnergetics, Integration of CranioSacral Therapy and Acupuncture, QiGong, and Higher Brain Living. She was co-director for 25 years of Camp Avanti—St. Croix, which was a special camp for children with sensory processing challenges. She speaks nationally and internationally on topics related to sensory processing and craniosacral therapy/ myofascial release. She is a Berard Auditory Integration Training instructor. Nancy also served on the board of Red Thread



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Charities which worked with orphanages in China to assist rehabilitation program development for their special needs children.

She is the creator and author of *Listening With the Whole Body* and co-author of *Core Concepts In Action*, *Astronaut Training: A Sound Activated Vestibular-Visual Protocol*, *Out of the Mouths of Babies* and *M.O.R.E: Integrating the Mouth with Sensory and Postural Functions*.
